## Media Watch - Week to 18/7/2015

- 12 July. SMH & Age: Young people opt for euthanasia drug as overall number of deaths grows. "More Australians are taking their own lives with a drug recommended by euthanasia groups, including people aged in their teens, 20s and 30s. New data from the national coronial information system shows 120 people died by taking Nembutal dubbed the "peaceful pill" between July 2000 and December 2012....The deaths included one person under the age of 20, 11 people in their 20s and 14 people in their 30s
- 13 July. SMH: <u>Deaths among young an unintended consequence of euthanasia movement: mother</u>. "Twenty-six-year-old Lucas Taylor took his own life by taking Nembutal more than three years ago, but he still gets Exit International's email newsletter. After his death in 2012 his mother Judith went through his emails looking for answers and found he had been a paid up member of the organisation."
- 14 July. The Age: Voluntary euthanasia consistent with religious principles, Christian group says. By Benjamin Priess. "Christians for Supporting Choice for Voluntary Euthanasia spokesman Geoffrey Williams said voluntary euthanasia was ethically consistent with a wide range of Christian views. "We're confident from the polls that the majority of people are on our side but they don't have the confidence to publicly say so," he said. Christian denominations such as the Catholic Church are opposed to euthanasia. Mr Williams said he hoped more Christian leaders would come forward and express their support for voluntary euthanasia."
