Palliative Care and Voluntary Euthanasia can They coexist?

These were my thoughts as I recently drove to the offices of Palliative Care W.A. in Shenton Park. I had arranged a meeting to discuss this issue with their Executive Officer, Amanda Bolliter, who was joined by Margaret Sealey, a retired nurse.

I was greeted warmly and opened the conversation by outlining WAVES' position on end-of-life choice, that I believed there was a close relationship between good palliative care and an end-of-life choice, and further, that both were part of the end-of-life process. I also pointed out that, when discussing this choice, it must be emphasised that the process is **voluntary** and has to be requested by the individual without any outside influence.

Amanda and Margaret expressed concerns, that when the Rights of the Terminally III legislation was in force between 1st of July 1996 and its demise following the passage of the Andrews Bill in Federal Parliament on 25th of March 1997, there was an exodus of palliative physicians. In fact, on checking later with the NT, I was advised that it wasn't so dramatic, as only one left, who was immediately replaced and a specific PC doctor was hired for the Central (Alice Springs) area.

PCWA are also concerned about the impact VE would have on indigenous and handicapped groups and whilst this may be a problem, I am sure given a suitable education campaign many of the fears could be allayed.

My visit concluded after an hour's discussion and although our ideas on the topic are still some way from harmonising, we have agreed to keep in touch and WAVES will become involved where possible in the activities of Palliative Care WA.

Following my visit I contacted Marshall Perron and Judy Dent in the NT, to check on some of the items discussed with Amanda and Margaret. I was sent a paper prepared in Belgium, the second country to legalise voluntary euthanasia, which discussed the development of palliative care and the legalisation of voluntary euthanasia.

Among the findings of this report were:

"The European Association for Palliative Care has voiced concerns that legalising euthanasia would be the start of a slippery slope resulting in harm to vulnerable patients such as elderly and disabled people and that it would impede the development of palliative care by appearing as an alternative. (But) Data from the Netherlands and Belgium, where euthanasia is legal, do not provide any evidence of a slippery slope"

In summary, this paper by Jan Bernheim and colleagues, made a telling point when it stated: "The development of palliative care and the process of legalisation of euthanasia can be mutually reinforcing".

This paper was published in The British Medical Journal 19 April 2008 and a copy has been sent to Palliative Care WA.

The journey continues!

AUSTRALIA 21 REPORT - Time for Legislation on Assisted Death

Following the report on the Round Table discussions held under the collaborative sponsorship of Australia21 and the Queensland University of Technology in Brisbane in January 2013 about the question "How should Australia regulate voluntary euthanasia and assisted suicide?", we have prepared the following letter which has been sent to all state politicians. It is self explanatory and we are awaiting responses which will be included in our next newsletter.

The West Australian Voluntary Euthanasia Society (WAVES) is currently contacting all Western Australian politicians both Upper and Lower House to gauge their reaction to the Australia 21 report entitled: 'The right to choose an assisted death: Time for legislation?'

I have been assured by Australia 21 that a copy of this report has been sent to all members of parliament at both state and federal levels. As this was done some time ago you will no doubt have received a copy and are, I hope, familiar with its content and recommendations.

The West Australian Voluntary Euthanasia Society was formed some thirty years ago to press for the introduction of carefully safeguarded legislation to the Western Australian Parliament to give citizens in WA an end of life choice. Our extensive membership consists of persons from the professions and general public who are committed to seeing such legislation introduced and passed in Western Australia. Given the growing world-wide passage of end of life legislation we feel that it is only a matter of time before such legislation is passed in Australia.

What is particularly notable about the Australia 21 report is that although members of the study group came from a wide range of interests and backgrounds, some for and some against, the final conclusion in Part 2 was that legislative change was needed. Further, that there was no compelling reason to resist such change.

The recommendations made in the report were:

- a) State governments should develop legislation now to permit and regulate voluntary euthanasia and assisted suicide in defined and limited circumstances.
- b) The Federal Parliament should restore powers that were withdrawn from the Territories so these parliaments may do the same; and
- c) Until the above happens each Member of Parliament should consider exercising his or her right to introduce a private member's bill on voluntary euthanasia and assisted suicide

WAVES is interested in your views on these recommendations and would request the opportunity to meet with you to discuss the matter at a time convenient to you.

We look forward to hearing from you.

President's Report 2012-2013

This year has seen some lows and highs and as there were fewer lows than highs I will comment on them first. The main setback in our national quest for VE legislation came with the defeat in the NSW parliament of Green's member Cate Feahrman's VE bill. It seems that conservative elements within the political landscape are not yet ready to show the necessary spine to pass sensibly safeguarded VE legislation. This is an area where we need to concentrate our persuasive efforts.

I had a recent meeting with Palliative Care WA and you will find a copy of my report in this newsletter. Suffice it to say we still have a way to go to convince those involved in the provision of palliative care that our organisations are complementary rather than at odds. Still, I think the dialogue was of value and this area will be progressed in the future as our population continues to age.

Another area of concern is the numbers turning increasingly towards "self deliverance". This is probably not a bad thing for those with access to a peaceful death, but it ignores the plight of those who do not. It also reinforces our demands for legislative change. Who knows what horrors await us when the system collapses under the weight of unsustainable demand?

On the brighter and more positive side, there is growing support at high levels for change and this is evidenced in a number of ways:

Organisations such as **Australia 21** have made recommendations to state governments that they should develop legislation now to permit and regulate voluntary euthanasia and assisted suicide in defined and limited circumstances. And further that Federal Parliament should restore the powers that were withdrawn from the territories so those parliaments can do the same. We have sent a letter to all state politicians referring them to the recommendations of the **Australia 21 Report**, of which I was assured by Australia 21, they all have a copy. We asked for their response and offered to meet with them for discussions. We wait with bated breath!

A Council on the Ageing forum held in NSW on the 27th of June had speakers on the topic "Let's talk about dying". And whilst some spoke against, the strongest arguments for change came from speakers such as Nicholas Cowdery QC and Prof Ken Hillman from the University of New South Wales. I will have a meeting with Chris Jeffrey of COTA on the day before our AGM so may have more to report then.

Support has also come prior to the last state election from Mark McGowan MLA Leader of the State Opposition, who stated that, if Labor became the government, he would introduce a bill to legalise VE. In the event, sadly for our cause at least, this did not eventuate and any legislation he may have proposed is now on the back burner.

Former leader of the Labor government in Queensland, Peter Beattie recently wrote a piece in support of VE in an eastern states paper. Let's hope that, if he wins a federal seat at the election, he will carry the same conviction with him. I don't think many of us believe in miracles but you never know! I should note that we have contributed \$5,000 to the election campaign of the Voluntary Euthanasia Party (VEP) to assist in getting the message out.

A meeting was held recently at the office of Robin Chapple MLC and suggestions by him are being considered. Robin is keen to present a fresh VE bill to parliament in a year and we will be assisting him where we can. He has asked that we examine the detail of his and Cate Feahrman's failed bills so that he may add to his research on his proposed bill. Linda Savage has kindly agreed to assist us. The most difficult task will be to convince the Premier of the need for his and his party's support of such a bill. Head against a brick wall springs to mind, however we mustn't falter! Robin also suggested that we publish our story in the press by way of a half or quarter page advertisement to attract comment and support. This will be considered by your committee.

In closing I refer you all to my item on Management Committee participation and look forward to your assistance in a future that will without doubt include voluntary euthanasia becoming legal in Western Australia.

WFRtDS ~ A Central Point for Information about VE



Most VE societies in Australia, and overseas, constantly try to keep their members informed of all the latest developments. To do this accurately they each have to research, evaluate,

publish and store information. Which means that they all do the same work. It is a laborious process and not every organisation has adequate resources to do it professionally. Duplication may result in misinformation as the original data get misinterpreted before being passed on. The obvious question is: Why not have a central point where all the information is collected and made available to everyone? Think of the money saved for other activities.

Do you know there is already such a central point?

The World Federation of Right-to-Die-Societies (WFRtDS) was set up in 1980 to provide an international link for organisations promoting VE law reform. Membership now consists of 51 right-to-die societies from 28 countries and membership is growing fast. All member VE societies are invited to contribute details, reports and local news to this office. Potentially, this could become the answer to every member's dream: to be relieved of all the information seeking-and-gathering.

Unfortunately, this opportunity has not yet been fully appreciated; there is still much scope for further development. It is up to members to help make it work.

CSC4VE ~ PC or PAD, but from whose point of view?

In April I listened to Lyle Shelton, Chief of Staff for the Australian Christian Lobby (ACL), debate with Richard Mills, DWDnsw's President, at The Wentworth Labor Party Forum.

A number of times when presenting his case against assisted dying, Mr Shelton referred to palliative sedation as being a suitable response by Palliative Care doctors when all other methods of controlling the symptoms fail.

I asked Mr Shelton afterwards whether he understood that palliative or terminal sedation means putting a person into a coma until they starve to death. He seemed unsure, and it appeared that he had not thought through the implications or personally witnessed such a death. I then pointed out that if the dying patient requested, "Rather than starve me to death in a coma, with the trauma of having my family watch this slow death, please give me the next 10 days medication in a single dose", this would be illegal. He agreed.

I then asked why he believed it was morally acceptable that the slow death procedure should be legal, but not a quick death?

He spoke about the possible disastrous effects on our society if this was allowed to happen.

As a fellow Christian, I was not convinced.

I have since posed this question to Probus audiences at Wagga and Berowra:

"Imagine you were dying, in a state like the one I have just described, or screaming in agony because prostate cancer has spread to your bones.

You have two choices -

- 1. Palliative or terminal sedation, put into a coma and you die slowly taking 10 days. Or:
- 2. Take the same medication, but in one dose, and you die within minutes."

Not one person in the audience opted for the slow death, and as far as I could see every hand went straight up as preferring the assisted death in that situation.

My Brief Future

In a few weeks I shall begin my seventy-ninth year. At my age there's not a lot that's in any way exciting to look forward to, and in my contemplative moods I more usually mull over the mix of successful, failed and embarrassing episodes of my life with a somewhat philosophical mind's eye. It's a bit too late to be emotional about any of it; I can't travel back in time to change anything.

However, there is one thing I know the future holds for me and my contemplation of it is certainly emotional. It is my own demise. Inevitable, of course and likely to occur fairly soon, but it is not the fact of it that concerns me as I have no fear of death itself; it is its possible nature that's worrying.

Before becoming a schoolteacher, I worked for a number of years as a technician in a number of hospital path labs. During that time, I witnessed many, too many, patients die in agony. Today, such people with prolonged terminal conditions end up in palliative care facilities where, if their condition is sufficiently prolonged and pain alleviating drugs have ceased to be effective, they too undergo extremes of pointless and demonstrably unnecessary suffering.

Their suffering is unnecessary because if the authorities running the facilities had a vestige of compassion they would arrange for an easy pain-free death for these patients. Sadly, many of those authorities are governed by malevolent religious dogma that is anything but compassionate.

Personally, I earnestly wish that my own death is easy when it occurs as I also wish the same for others. If only our state and federal governments would ignore the religious lobby groups and enact legislation to ensure the legality of voluntary euthanasia without making it impossibly complicated to arrange, we could then all be less afraid and sleep more easily at night.
